II. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will introduce students to the historical components that contributed to the creation and evolution of civilizations on both sides of the Mediterranean. The course will focus on the Ancient Middle East, Judaism, the Greek and Roman world, Christianity, the world of Islam, Italy, and Spain. It will be complemented with a travel to Sicily, where its heritage includes all these elements. Professor Warden will give specific lectures on archeology and the study of ancient civilizations.

III. SPECIFIC LEARNING OUTCOMES

The goal of this class is to develop a comprehensive understanding of the dynamics of the evolution of civilizations in the Mediterranean world in terms of conflict, cooperation, and synthesis and of their contribution to today's Mediterranean world and states.

VII. ASSESSMENT OVERVIEW

Students will be assessed upon the basis of their performance on a midterm examination, a research paper, their attendance and participation in class lectures and discussions, and a final examination. The midterm is worth 15%, research paper is worth 20%, and attendance is worth 15%. The research paper must be a minimum of ten pages, devoted to a topic related the politics, society, and civilizations of the Mediterranean world. Research will be judged by the ability to use readings and to produce a relevant, original analysis, not a summary. Topics must be discussed and approved by instructor beforehand, and must be submitted in a ½ page proposal by the specified date. A student's ability to employ formal English is an expectation. Correct formatting (Times New Roman font, 12pt, Chicago-style citation) will be standard for the submission. The class final will count as 50% of grade.
