3-YEAR DEGREE

Designed for students with advanced standing credits (equivalent to 30 US credits), this accelerated program is ideal for dedicated learners who have followed a rigorous high school curriculum and are ready to focus on a specific major from the start.

GAP YEAR PROGRAM

A gap year allows high school graduates to explore their interests before starting university. It can be a semester or full year of experiential learning, providing opportunities to gain practical, professional, and personal experience.

FOUNDATION YEAR

For students transitioning to an English-language academic program or needing additional academic support, this program strengthens skills in academic writing and study habits while providing guided support for a smooth university transition.

HONORS PROGRAM

For talented and highly motivated students, the Honors Program combines targeted tutorials with an interdisciplinary seminar series, fostering advanced research skills and cross-disciplinary collaboration with faculty and peers.

THE GLOBAL BA / FRANKLIN-EMERSON ASSOCIATE DEGREE

In partnership with Emerson College, this program allows students to earn both an associate's degree from Franklin and a bachelor's degree from Emerson. Students spend two years in Lugano and two years in Boston, benefiting from the strengths and expertise of both institutions. Ph.D. IN POLITICAL SCIENCE

The Ph.D. in Political Science at Franklin Switzerland is a four-year, full-time doctoral program designed to train future scholars in rigorous, original, and impactful research. MAST is a one-year, three-semester program totaling 45 credits (90 ECTS), with an optional fourth semester dedicated to a research thesis, extending the program to 120 ECTS. Through interdisciplinary coursework, real-world projects, and immersive retreats in Zurich and Geneva, the program equips students with the skills and insights needed to navigate complexity and shape the future, from policy and education to business and community leadership.
